





MARTIN LUTHER KING JR DAY OF SERVICE OBSERVED

Taking place each year on the third Monday in January, the MLK Day of Service is the only federal holiday observed as a national day of service – a "day on, not a day off".


After a long struggle, legislation was signed in 1983 creating a federal holiday marking the birthday of Rev.Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. In 1994, Congress designated the Martin Luther King Jr. Federal Holiday as a national day of service.

- Received Ph.D. by the age of 22
- At 26 years old, led boycott of segregated Montgomery buses which gains national attention
 In 10(2) he delivers "I Here A
- In 1963, he delivers "I Have A

- In 1964, Congress passed Civil Rights Act of 1964
- Youngest person to receive
 Nobel Peace Prize in 1964
- Voting Rights Act of 1965 passed
- April 4, 1968, Dr. King was shot and killed while visiting Memphis in support of striking

black garbage collectors.

Graphic Novels: Promoting Reading with a Different Approach


Picking up a book in the young adult section of the library, you may discover a colorful book with words and pictures. This lively literary art form appeals to young people for a variety of reasons, and librarians encourage the circulation of these graphic novels.

A graphic novel is essentially a comic book that can be either fiction or non-fiction. The style of the book is entirely up to the illustrator and/or writer (who are often the same person). Since graphic novels are primarily made up of drawings, you can finish reading them in a matter of hours.

But that doesn't make them any less significant or less challenging than other books. <u>Diary of a Wimpy Kid</u> written by Jeff Kinney became wildly popular with middle school

students. This series which now has 12 installments of the antics of middle schooler, Greg Heffley, and his best friend, Rowley. Two other popular graphic novel series for young readers are the Captain Underpants books and Dog Man collection both by Dave Pilkey. These books contain a huge dose of middle school humor while emphasizing friendship and tolerance.

Two new graphic novels series soon to be added to circulation at the DCL are <u>Lunch Ladies</u> by Jarrett J. Krosoczka and Nancy Drew by Stefan Petrucha and illustrated by Sho Murase. These graphic-novel-style versions of the Hardy Boys and Nancy Drew adventures will appeal to young graphic-novel fans as well as readers new to the venerable amateur sleuths. And, the superhero cafeteria workers join forces with several middle school students to solve mysteries on campus complete with high-tech kitchen gadgets. Check out the graphic novels at the DCL!
